
The year 2023 reaffirmed our commitment to collaboration, not only within the humanitarian community but







Uniting for Humanity

In line with its vision as "The Pioneering Global Humanitarian Hub," Dubai Humanitarian takes on a leading role in advancing a global intergovernmental network of sister humanitarian hubs. This strategic initiative aims to boost the collective efforts of the humanitarian community around the world, focusing on emergency preparedness and response, as well as fostering innovation and sustainability in humanitarian actions.

Harnessing Innovation for Global Impact

Dubai Humanitarian's pivotal role in this visionary assignment is rooted in its commitment to innovation, exemplified by the Humanitarian Logistics Databank. The ultimate goal is to harness the power of this Databank on a global scale, facilitating seamless information sharing among the 11 humanitarian hubs and building a net zero sustainable humanitarian supply chain, making the humanitarian industry, once again, an example of conviction, ethics, and innovation.





Solidarity in Action The First Conference

Amidst complex humanitarian issues and urgent queries, the First Conference for Hosting Countries of the World's Humanitarian Hubs was convened on the margins of COP28 last December. Organized by Dubai Humanitarian in collaboration with the United Arab Emirates' Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA), the conference brought together representatives from hosting countries including the UAE, Spain, Panama, Malaysia, Cameroon, Italy, and Jordan.

Joining Forces

This First Conference, which is taking place here, During the conference, esteemed leaders highlighted features, for the first time, the Relief, Recovery and Peace Day, marking the first official discussion of peace humanitarian emergencies. • A unified goal emerged to align the humanitarian supply chain with global commitments such as the Paris Agreement and broader objectives set by the humanitarian community.

Crucial Partnerships

• Partnerships across sectors, including the private sector, academia, governments, international organizations, and the UN, were identified as crucial in driving legislative integration, innovation, and the adoption of circular practices.

OPENING REMAR

Panel Discussion Insights

Moderated by Benjamin Safari, Head of Supply Chain Management at UNHCR, the panel featured insights from industry leaders including Simon Missiri, Special Representative of IFRC, Francesca Cocozza, Director of NRS Relief, Raji Hattar, Chief Sustainability Officer at Aramex, and Sherring Thekekkara, the Global Executive Vice President of DP World Logistics. They emphasized collective responsibility and collaboration as key drivers of sustainable change.

In the closing remarks, Simonetta Di Pippo, Director of SEELab at SDA Bocconi & NYUAD visiting professor, and former director of the UN Office for Outer Space Affairs, underscored the challenges posed by climate change and emphasized the importance of commitment and action in fostering sustainability.



The Global Humanitarian Fund

The Global Humanitarian Impact Fund for Emergency Preparedness and Response (GHIF) is a major tool by Dubai Humanitarian in favor of humanitarian crisis prevention, readiness, and response.

It is designed to be a funding connector and serves as a reserve allocation pool. The GHIF acts as a swift donor in support of relief operations by Dubai Humanitarian members, especially at the onset of a crisis; It helps Dubai Humanitarian secure the purchase and transportation of aid items rapidly.




Since 2018, Dubai Humanitarian has supported 24 responses to humanitarian emergencies through the GHIF with more than AED 34 million.










Our Emergency Response Support

The humanitarian operations by Dubai Humanitarian in 2023 involved various avenues through which airlifts were facilitated. These included the utilization of planes provided by the Dubai Royal Airwing (DAW), generously made available by HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum. Additionally, humanitarian efforts were carried out aboard flights facilitated by Emirates, as well as through commercial companies, with costs covered by the Global Humanitarian Impact Fund (GHIF). 



In the challenging landscape of Pakistan's healthcare crisis, diabetes is widespread. Along with its overpopulation and limited medical facilities, unfortunately, Pakistan also has the highest diabetes prevalence in the world.

AIMS Pakistan, a charitable organisation, stands out for its impactful role. The innovative and unique Circle of Care, a one-stop system providing several vital services in a single visit for diabetic patients, makes a big difference. glucometer to check my sugar level at home. Volunteers' dedication and the staff's hard work in hospitals and rural medical camps amplify the charity's reach, delivering essential services to those in need.

The tireless efforts and ongoing support from members and associates within and beyond Pakistan play a crucial role in making AIMS a lifeline for deserving individuals and families.

Hazrat Umer and his family spoke to us in the village of Matani, 35 km away from Sugar Hospital Peshawar.

In his late teens, sitting next to his dad, Hazrat said, "I was diagnosed with diabetes six years ago. I used to be ill most days and unable to get insulin regularly. Sometimes, I used to borrow money from friends or family for my insulin and treatment. We use a home water mud pitcher to store insulin because we cannot afford a fridge. After hearing about "Sugar Hospital," I went there. I was registered and treated by doctors and nurses, and I had my laboratory tests. I now receive insulin and treatment regularly. They also gave me a glucometer to check my sugar level at home. I feel better and can



8-year-old Alamgir was born near the capital of Bangladesh. Darkness cast its shadow not only on his vision but also on his life and the lives of his family. He couldn't even navigate within his own home, let alone keep up with his studies; this led to a sense of social isolation and diminished ambition.

Adding to the difficulty, Alamgir's hardworking boatman father couldn't afford the expenses of his son's treatment. However, hope was rekindled when he heard about Al Basar International Foundation's medical campaign in the city of Dhaka, which treats victims of reversible blindness. Alamgir and his father visited the hospital, where doctors confirmed the presence of cataracts in both of his eyes.

Al Basar International Foundation and its teams across Asia and Africa, operating from the charity foundation's hospitals, provide medical services to the poor and needy. 2,148 campaigns have been completed, benefiting 2.4 million people, including Alamgir, who underwent successful eye surgery.

His parents were overwhelmed with joy when their child regained sight. He was able to see his loved ones again and could continue his education with contentment and optimism. His mother said, "You have done the impossible; my son can see. Thanks to Allah, and thanks to you for this blessing."

Al Basar International Foundation, along with its partners and supporters, continues to enhance the positive impact of voluntary and humanitarian work by reducing the high rate of reversible blindness worldwide and restoring hope to many who have lost their vision.





In its 7-year journey, Aster Volunteers, the global CSR arm of Aster DM Healthcare, registered through Aster DM Foundation International at the Dubai Humanitarian, has touched the lives of 5 million + people. The organization focuses on healthcare, education, social empowerment, environmental sustainability, and disaster aid in the Middle East, Africa, India & SAARC regions, engaging 75,000+ volunteers. The organization works in strategic partnership with various institutions, adhering to goal number 17 of UNSDG.

Mobile Medical Services

The units deliver primary healthcare directly to the doorsteps of the underprivileged. 1,240,828 individuals benefited over the last 7 years through a growing global network of 30+ medical units.

Treatment Aid

Aster Volunteers Treatment Aid ensures quality healthcare for the underprivileged by providing subsidized/free procedures and treatments. In 2023, 57,359 people benefitted from \$1.2 million in aid.

Disaster Aid

In response to the devastating natural calamities and humanitarian crises in the past in Morocco, Turkiye, Syrian refugee camps, Gaza, Yemen, Somalia, Lebanon, India, and Pakistan, Aster Volunteers mobilized either skilled medical professionals or medical/essentials supplies in collaboration with the Emirates Red Crescent or

partnered NGOs and local authorities, benefited to 316,051 people. Aster Volunteers helped the devastated Kerala flood victims with about \$2.4 million worth of aid, including handing over 255 Aster Homes (2 BHK). Aster Volunteers made a significant impact, reaching 2,047,214 individuals through food distribution, webinars, COVID camps, and free vaccinations during the COVID period and have airlifted \$0.5 million worth of medical equipment from UAE to the Kerala Government partnered with Dubai Humanitarian and the Indian Community in the UAE.





In 2023, Bring Hope Humanitarian Foundation successfully implemented initiatives in collaboration with partner organizations, showcasing their commitment to social and environmental causes. In Iraqi Kurdistan, the organization collaborated with JINDA organization to execute the "Women Empowering Women in Conflict Prevention and Response Strategies" program. The program involved training sessions, through which Bring Hope also established a Women's Council, where the members engaged with stakeholders, authorities, and decision-makers, resulting in 40 targeted actions to address women's challenges.

Bring Hope also collaborated with the KOKAR Foundation on the "Towards a Green Iraq" initiative. Activities included conducting training sessions with students and teachers in Kirkuk City, distributing educational materials on tree planting, and providing them with seeds from native trees. The project received acclaim, earning Bring Hope the "Dubai Humanitarian Award" for the best climate change and sustainability project in March 2023, highlighting their dedication to environmental conservation.

Securing funding from the European Commission Erasmus+ program in 2022, Bring Hope launched two projects in Sweden in 2023: HistoryBox and COREcoles. The former aimed at promoting the integration of refugees and migrants through history education, while the latter focused on supporting the psycho-emotional resilience of children aged 6 to 12.

Throughout the year, Bring Hope Iraq conducted nine distributions in collaboration with donor organizations, addressing diverse community needs, including recreational, educational, clothing, hygiene, and food items. Additionally, the 'Stuff the Bus with Hope' campaign, in collaboration with STS Group, engaged Dubai school children in collecting supplies for those in need, showcasing the organization's continuous efforts to make a positive impact.







CCCL'S TRIUMPH OVER FINANCIAL CHALLENGES

A Year in Review" The Children's Cancer Center of Lebanon (CCCL), a beacon of hope NGO, covers standard treatment costs for children with cancer for around 50% of cases in Lebanon, regardless of any background and parents' ability to pay. CCCL has navigated a challenging year amid economic difficulties and the troubled regional environment. As a vital component of Lebanon's socio and eco-system, CCCL faced financial constraints, exacerbated by the country's economic crisis and the broader regional instability. However, in a remarkable display of resilience, CCCL organized a groundbreaking telethon in collaboration with a prominent TV channel. This telethon, a pivotal moment in CCCL's history, was a response to a deficit of \$4 million that threatened the center's operations. With unwavering determination, CCCL leveraged its resources, network, and the support of dedicated board members and generous donors.

The telethon, moderated by the esteemed Mr. Marcel Ghanem, featured survivors, patients, oncologists, influencers, parents, and staff on stage, creating an emotional and impactful narrative. The live four-hour-long episode succeeded in bridging the financial gap, with the largest donation reaching an impressive \$1 million. The telethon not only showcased the center's commitment to its mission but also highlighted the unity and generosity of the community. It was a momentous occasion that underscored the importance of collective action in overcoming challenges.



In the tumultuous year of 2023, the world faced unprecedented natural and man-made disasters, underscoring the critical need for efficient humanitarian aid and logistics. FAMBRAS, in collaboration with the Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum Charitable and Humanitarian Foundation, has implemented the "Together for All" initiative. The event took place on December 10, 2023, in Brasília, the federal capital of Brazil,. It benefitted one of the largest and poorest neighborhoods in Latin America, Sol Nascente and Pôr do Sol, with a population of 360,000. The event was attended by local government authorities, federal government representatives, and other officials from the presidency and various governmental institutions. A series of charitable activities targeting the most vulnerable groups were conducted inside a Brazilian government school. Health played a pivotal role in this event, with comprehensive eye examinations conducted for all 1,000 elementary school students, revealing that 27% of the students (270 students) needed eyeglasses, and many had severe vision impairment.


Additionally, thousands of free medical examinations were provided, including blood pressure, diabetes, cholesterol, and viral

hepatitis tests, along with eye examinations, nutritional guidance, breast cancer prevention counseling, and free vaccinations. Several tons of essential food baskets and meat were distributed, along with citizen services such as haircuts and skincare.

Simultaneously, joy filled the streets as children and teenagers participated in cultural and entertainment activities like balloon sculpting and face painting. Inflatable games, cultural performances, popcorn, and cotton candy added to the array of activities and services. Gifts were distributed to all the attending children.

The happiness was evident in the streets, and the event will forever remain in the memory of the residents of this impoverished neighborhood. The communities not only received material assistance but also experienced solidarity that transcends the boundaries of humanity. Finally, kindness is a way to spread love to those in dire need, and "Together for All" is evidence that when we unite, we can look forward to a better future.





ABDULLA - AN EYE HERO

My name is Abdullah. I am in class 4 at Doha Government Primary School in Barisal, Bangladesh. My dream is to become a doctor, but I also have a deep love for planting trees. Trees are incredible—they give us life.

My favorite subject in school is Bangla. It's my mother tongue, and the words flow effortlessly from my heart. Through Bangla, I can truly express myself, my thoughts, and my dreams. One day at school, my entire world was transformed. I heard whispers from my teachers about the School Champions Training Program supported by The Fred Hollows Foundation and the Noor Dubai Foundation. It was a unique program about eye health that piqued my curiosity. Why the fascination with eyes? The answer is simple—our eyes are windows to the soul, the source of our vision and connection to the world.

I was excited to join the training program. I learned how to test vision with the E Chart. I also discovered how to assess the vision of my classmates and detect if anyone had a hidden problem with their eyes due to uncorrected refractive error.

As I sat there, absorbing every piece of knowledge, my dream of becoming a doctor was formed. I want to become an eye doctor, a guardian of sight. Eyes are the essence of our existence. They are our companions in this journey called life.

But what I cherish most is the memory of teaching my classmates how to test their eyevision using the E chart. The joy I felt as we stood 20 feet away from the chart, each of us taking turns covering one eye with a hand and then the other, is indescribable. I realized the power of knowledge and the potential to make a difference in the lives of others.



RESCUE AND SUPPORT OPERATIONS

In Turkiye and Syria: Rapid intervention was made after the devastating earthquake to rescue and treat more than 1,300 domestic and farm animals by providing veterinary treatments and some fodder and to assist in recovery efforts by restoring some barns for the local community and supporting livelihoods.

In Libya: The terrifying flood in the Derna region in northeastern Libya caused many losses, so we contributed to the rescue operations of farm animals and livestock and provided treatment, vaccines, and fodder for livestock owners in cooperation with "The Libyan Wildlife Trust" and "Al-Hayat Organization for the Protection of Wildlife and Marine Organism."

In Morocco: Rescue operations were supported, and assistance was provided to farm and transport animals in the mountainous region affected by the earthquake that struck southern Morocco. The local community was supported through the "SPANA Organization," which focused on rescue and disaster preparedness activities.

In Lebanon: In continuation of the "Levant Operation for Bird Rescue" (LOBR) project, we, with our partner, the Lebanese Association for Migratory Birds, followed up rescue and

rehabilitation operations for birds injured due to discrimination and illegal hunting activities. After full recovery, 15 birds were successfully released into the wild. Awareness campaigns for all components of the local community (schools, hunters, and law enforcers) were also delivered.

ORGANIZING AND SUPPORTING INTERNATIONAL POLICIES

Participating in the 28th Climate Change CoP at Expo City, Dubai, by organizing events, activities, and dialogues to highlight the role of nature in finding solutions to combat climate change and protect residents in areas exposed to the effects of this phenomenon.

TRAINING EVENTS

Organizing training workshops in Sudan and the UAE for cadres from the environment, municipalities, and customs to confront illegal wildlife trade and reduce their smuggling, and training in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia to assess the needs of wildlife law enforcement and strengthen partnerships and cooperation between those agencies to tackle illegal trade in big cat species in and across the region.





In Kazakhstan, winter weather can be extremely harsh, with temperatures plummeting to -40 C at night. This presents a challenge for all people, but especially for some of the most vulnerable groups: homeless, lonely older people, people with disabilities, and single-parent households.

"I am all alone in this world," one 81-year-old woman told a Red Crescent team. "I'm grateful to the RC volunteers for bringing me soup, buns, and pilaf. "

Whenever the cold becomes extreme, the RC of Kazakhstan is ready to support people in need thanks to a system initiated by the IFRC that allows them to mobilize resources as soon as a severe cold wave is predicted.

GETTING AHEAD OF THE COLD WAVES

Through the activation of the Simplified Early Action Protocol (EAP) for Cold Waves, the Red Crescent is receiving 68,000 Swiss francs from the IFRC to be used over the next three months to fund anticipatory actions supporting 2,000 people in the worst-affected regions and reach a further 80,000 with awareness-raising activities.

"This simplified early action protocol allows us to support people surviving extreme cold in the most difficult conditions and to do it quickly," said Lena Kistaubayeva, director of the Emergency Situations Department at the RC of Kazakhstan.

HOT MEALS, CLOTHES, AND BLANKETS

Throughout the winter, RC teams have been helping homeless people reach warm shelters and providing them with hot meals and basic items such as winter clothes, shoes, and blankets. Volunteers are also providing First Aid at warm-up shelters.

IHHN's Physical Rehabilitation services have provided 4,600+ prosthetic and orthotic devices and conducted 66,700+ physical therapy sessions.

This immersive experience unveils the positive changes brought about by sustainable water access, all made possible by Project Maji. Beyond a simulation, this experience stands out as a unique, interactive tool, offering participants a clear window into the harsh reality of global water scarcity.

Within 4 minutes, the Virtual Reality Experience takes the form of an engaging exploration. Participants actively navigate through the challenges millions face, experiencing firsthand the impact of Project Maji's sustainable water solutions on Dagbe's life.

Originally developed for and showcased at COP 28, the Project Maji Virtual Reality Experience is a valuable educational resource. The clarity and simplicity of the narrative ensure that users comprehend the gravity of the global water crisis, prompting them to take action. Project Maji invites users to step into the shoes of those affected by water scarcity, inspiring empathy and understanding.

In the realm of rural water initiatives, this Virtual Reality Experience is unparalleled, providing a unique lens into the importance of sustainable solutions. With each moment spent immersed in this educational tool, Project Maji aims to cultivate a future where safe water access is a basic right and users are empowered to advocate for change.



In 2014, our story began with a dream and \$200. Witnessing the impact of war on people's lives, a group of young people led by Dr. Shadi Zaza felt compelled to offer help. The process of creative arts therapy allows our beneficiaries to express the unspeakable, experience release and relief, find new resources, gain self-confidence, and feel empowered to move on toward a more hopeful and happier life.

At The Red Pencil, we are dedicated to the resilience and long-term recovery of the most vulnerable from all walks of life, allowing them to grow and become healthy and happy human beings for tomorrow. In 2023, The Red Pencil's mission spread across a series of countries, including Belgium, Romania, Turkiye, and Singapore, enabling hundreds of participants to envision a future of change and self-empowerment through creative arts therapy.

In 2023, we supported, among others, victims of the earthquake in Turkiye by training volunteer psychologists in the use of arts-based tools. We also worked with hospitalized children in Lebanon, with art therapy interventions to support them and their families and with training for their caregivers.





ROOM TO READ IS MAKING ROOM FOR A MORE EQUITABLE, RESILIENT FUTURE IN VIETNAM

At Room to Read, we know that to address the mounting challenges of climate change, we need climate justice education — education that includes lessons on the science of climate change as well as its social ramifications around gender equity. When more girls are equipped with knowledge about the gendered consequences of climate change and gain the skills to take action in their lives and communities, entire countries can benefit from improved life outcomes.

With this in mind, our Vietnam team recently introduced climate-focused content to our girls' education curriculum, initiating lessons on climate justice at two secondary schools in regions of the Mekong Delta most threatened by saltwater intrusion. Implemented in partnership with the Vĩnh Long Provincial Department of Education and Training, Room to Read's climate content aims to engage more than 250 students of all genders over the next two years in discussions on the intersections between climate change and gender inequality. These discussions have supported other life skills lessons, bolstering students' confidence in thinking critically and making difficult decisions about potential climate change mitigation and adaptation strategies.



HOW SMILE TRAIN HELPED ONE FAMILY MOVE FROM SHOCK TO SMILES

For Nagla and Mohamed, life was perfect. They were the proud parents of three healthy girls and made just enough to provide them all with good educations and a stable life. Then Nagla discovered she was pregnant again.

The news was a shock but a happy one, and when Mohamed learned the baby would be a boy, he wanted to shout his joy for all to hear.

Mohamed felt bad; his family's faces in the sterile, overbright waiting room made clear he was not alone. As the minutes fell away, his terror ticked up. No one spoke so as not to tempt the evil eye—time slogged on. Minutes came to feel like hours. The family stopped even looking at one another. Then, a doctor's head poked out. "Where is the father of this child?" Mohamed ran to him. "Your son was born with a cleft, but it can be treated nowadays." Mohamed opened his mouth to respond, but no words would come. "It's going to be okay," he said. "It can be cured." Now, the words came. Mohamed thanked the doctor and prayed that his child would be healed. He gave his family the update, then added a special request for his father: "Please tell Nagla about the baby's condition. I can't tell her myself." I was so confused, really stressed, and couldn't figure out what to do," he later recalled.

In 2023, Soroptimist International Gulf Dubai held awareness activities and funded projects to educate, empower, and enable women around the world. This year's main project was to bolster food security and improve women's livelihoods in a rural community in Uganda. The Dubai chapter provided the community with two 100-kilo, solar-powered food dehydrator units. These have provided women and youth with a critical means to avoid food waste from spoilage and to sell various food products at the local market.

In addition, we supported a project in Kenya to support female victims of female genital mutilation (FGM) in a remote Masai community. A local shelter was provided the means to rehabilitate a condemned latrine block to give girls a private, hygienic, and safe toilet. This keeps girls safe from being assaulted when seeking a place to defecate in the open and gives them back their dignity. More is needed to provide acceptable living conditions for girls subjected to or fleeing FGM. This year, we launched a partnership between the Soroptimist International Africa Federation and the United Nations Health4Life Fund to contribute the voice of women and funding from the worldwide Soroptimist network to the global campaign to eliminate cervical cancer.

Today, one woman dies needlessly every two minutes from cervical cancer. Soroptimists are proud to contribute to country goals to reach the WHO elimination targets of 90% of girls vaccinated against HPV, 70% of women screened, and 90% of women diagnosed getting access to treatment.



The Sparkle Foundation's success in 2023 would not have been possible without the contributions and support from our growing community, shaping our journey in the UK, UAE, and Malawi.

From volunteer trips to Malawi to remote and in-person volunteering in the UK and UAE, fundraising events (such as Sparkle Sevens, Sparkle UK Ball, and Sparkle Gala by EMIR), and training opportunities, 2023 was nothing short of inspiring!

In 2023 at Sparkle:

- 414 students enrolled in the Sparkle education programme, with 80 graduating to secondary school
- 9219 clinic visits were facilitated at the Sparkle Clinic
- 125 community members were supported through the Women Group and Youth Group programmes
- 98,780 meals served to Sparkle children and staff members across both sites (Zomba main site and Mulunguzi ECD)
- 554 players engaged in Football and Netball matches with the wider community through our Sports programmes

2024 is due to be a transformative year for The Sparkle Foundation in Malawi, with the opening of our third and fourth sites, as well as the extension of the Mulunguzi ECD centre and launch of the Sparkle Farm. The continuation and development of our Sparkle operations are even more important, as the harsh reality in Malawi includes a predicted 4.4 million people (22% of the total Malawian population) face starvation by March 2024, compounded by the long-term consequences of Cyclone Freddy and the 44% devaluation of the Kwacha.

Thanks to the ongoing support of our Sparkle family and the evergrowing movement of changemakers, we are so excited to take Sparkle from strength to strength and change more lives.





The Citizens Foundation (TCF) is a professionally managed non-profit organization that builds and operates formal schools in the urban slums and rural areas of Pakistan. It is a platform for positive change aiming to address Pakistan's learning crisis. It was founded as a non-profit organisation in 1995 by a group of friends with a vision to drive positive change through quality education. Today, with 286,000 students enrolled in 1,921 school units led by its 14,000 female faculty members, TCF is recognised by The Economist as 'perhaps the largest network of independently run schools in the world.

Through TCF's Early Years Model, based on global best practices, TCF is developing essential 21st-century skills and the joy of learning in every student.

TCF is building digital-age skills in its students through the cutting-edge Digital Literacy Programme. This programme gives students access to a contemporary curriculum and modern digital technologies, fuels their interest in Computer Science, and educates them about digital citizenship.

Beyond developing its innovative education model, TCF also enables its alumni to access higher education opportunities and collaborates with the State to improve outcomes in the public sector. The organisation seeks to uplift communities by empowering them with literacy, life skills, and vocational competencies, particularly focusing on women. In 2021, the Library of Congress recognized the TCF Adult Literacy Programme as Best Practice Honoree.

By sharing with other stakeholders the programmes, experiences, and capabilities it has developed over the last 28 years, TCF aims to improve outcomes across Pakistan's education landscape.



A crucial factor in quickly getting supplies into disaster areas is having them available for transport in the event of an emergency. This is why, in the aftermath of two devastating earthquakes that struck Syria and Türkiye in February 2023, UNICEF mobilized prepositioned life-saving supplies in-country and from Global Supply Hubs for children and families affected by the tragedy.

UNICEF's Dubai supply hub was at the centre of the earthquake response. Due to favourable geographic proximity, Dubai Humanitarian has been a key location for pre-positioning and dispatching UNICEF's emergency supplies, where 3,000 m² of warehouses serve as a humanitarian hub. Inside, thousands of pallets hold items such as water and sanitation kits, hygiene supplies, high-performance tents, tarpaulins, blankets, jerry cans, and much more – the essentials needed to survive in the aftermath of a disaster such as an earthquake.

UNICEF's initial focus was ensuring people could access safe drinking water and sanitation services. In Dubai, warehouse staff worked around the clock to ensure supplies were packed as quickly as possible and loaded onto trucks bound for the airport, where they would be boarded on a charter flight to Damascus. Within 18 days of the earthquakes, UNICEF delivered 258 metric tons of vital supplies from Dubai to Syria and Türkiye.

Besides Copenhagen (home to the world's largest humanitarian warehouse) and Dubai, UNICEF has three other Global Supply Hubs in Brindisi, Guangzhou, and Panama City. These hubs remain at the heart of efforts to get urgently needed supplies to children and families as quickly as possible.





In 2023, the UN World Food Programme (WFP) intensified its efforts to provide critical support to a rising number of crisis and conflict-driven emergencies and operations around the world.

The generous contributions from the GCC government partners amounted to more than USD 52 million. These in-kind and financial contributions from the UAE, the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, and Qatar, supported ongoing WFP operations and provided life-saving humanitarian assistance in 17 countries, including Afghanistan, Bangladesh, El Salvador, Guinea, Honduras, Kenya, Niger, Pakistan, Palestine, Somalia, South Sudan, Sri-Lanka, Sudan, Syria, Tanzania, Turkiye, and Yemen.

Global emergencies and operations received prompt and vital support from the UNHRD Dubai hub through a total of 404 shipments of aid and relief cargo that got dispatched to 77 countries on behalf of WFP and 31 humanitarian partners. The shipments included logistics, food security, nutrition, emergency shelter, health, protection, wash, camp management, staff supplies, and emergency telecom equipment, valued at more than USD 48.4 million.

WFP FITTEST specialists were deployed to 39 countries while the Emergency Telecommunications Cluster (ETC) coordinated emergency responses in 12 countries. The cluster's work connected 9,195 humanitarian users from 360 organizations. During 2023, WFP's Fleet Centre enabled WFP personnel to deliver vital humanitarian aid by

preparing and dispatching 532 light vehicles from Dubai, including 54 armoured vehicles, and by delivering an 'Advance driver training' programme to 868 WFP and other UN organisations personnel. Additionally, a digital solution called "Fuel App" to track and account for the fuel was rolled out by Dubai-based WFP Fleet Centre staff in 65 WFP offices.

Furthermore, WFP Regional Aviation Safety Office based in the UAE facilitated regional humanitarian aviation operations by conducting more than 5 air operator base risk evaluations and 20 field evaluations for more than 1,500 attendees. Moreover, RASO trained more than 8,000 learners globally through 15 computer-based trainings, ensuring the safety and efficiency of humanitarian air operations.



An estimated 363 million people needed humanitarian assistance in 2023, more than any other point in human history. The vast majority were at risk from disease outbreaks and lack of access to essential medicines. Driven by conflict, fragile health systems, natural disasters, climate change-related events, and outbreaks of infectious disease, more and more people continue to face threats to human health.

Responding to acute health emergencies, the World Health Organization's logistics hub, based within Dubai Humanitarian, completed a record 35 charter flights in 2023, delivering more supplies to more people more quickly than ever before.

Beginning with the catastrophic earthquake in Turkiye /Syria, continuing with outbreaks of cholera, the Yemen response, the conflict in Sudan, the earthquake in Afghanistan, the Libya Flood, and most recently, the humanitarian crisis in Gaza, the scale and number of health emergencies increased at an alarming rate. Delivering over 2,000 metric tons of trauma and emergency surgery supplies, essential medicines, and health equipment to over 80 countries, the WHO logistics hub served as a lifeline for many member states and their health systems.

As health emergencies increased around the world, WHO needed assistance to cope with the surging demands for health supplies. Dubai Humanitarian, WFP/UNHRD, and ECHO provided critical support by coordinating emergency air operations to enable WHO to deliver trauma supplies in response to natural disasters and conflicts while simultaneously providing life-saving medicines to countries such as Gaza, Yemen, Afghanistan, and Syria. These partnerships, coupled with the tremendous support and generosity of the Government of the United Arab Emirates, the Government of Dubai, the Dubai Humanitarian, and WFP/UNHRD, remain a vital part of WHO's health emergency response.







World Vision is a global humanitarian organization dedicated to tackling the root causes of poverty and injustice to improve the well-being of children and their communities. With operations in 100 countries and 35,000 staff, World Vision works with communities, governments, and partners to address issues such as hunger, healthcare, education, and economic development. The organization's mission is grounded in the belief that every child deserves a life free from poverty and full of opportunities. World Vision emphasizes long-term sustainable development, aiming to create lasting change by empowering communities to become self-reliant and resilient.

Facing humanitarian emergencies, World Vision responds swiftly and comprehensively, deploying trained staff, pre-positioning supplies, and collaborating with local communities. Immediate relief efforts include food, water, shelter, healthcare, and protection. Beyond relief, World Vision prioritizes long-term recovery, emphasizing community participation and resilience-building.

Dubai Humanitarian has been home to World Vision for two decades. Leveraging its unique location and fostering relationships with humanitarian partners, World Vision has collaborated with Dubai Humanitarian members, including WFP/UNHRD Dubai, to address diverse humanitarian crises. The collaboration includes pre-positioning stock and dispatch, which is crucial for swift and impactful assistance. Dubai Humanitarian is also home to World

Vision's deployed humanitarian emergency teams.

The Dubai Hub stands out for its efficiency in responding to diverse humanitarian crises, as well as the leadership and support extended by Dubai Humanitarian. This support encompasses financial contributions and coordination with the UAE government and partners, significantly enhancing the efficiency and impact of our response efforts.

Throughout 2020 to the present, collaboration with Dubai Humanitarian has positioned World Vision at the forefront of addressing critical crises, including the Afghanistan Crisis, the Afghanistan Earthquake, the Ukraine Response, and the Ethiopia Tigray Response. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Dubai Humanitarian, alongside partners UNHRD Dubai, WHO, and WFP, played a commendable role in helping to facilitate World Vision's response to communities worldwide, including the Central African Republic, Lebanon, Georgia, Solomon Islands, Mauritania, South Sudan, Uganda, and Zambia.

World Vision and Dubai Humanitarian's partnership goes beyond immediate disaster response efforts. Each year, World Vision and other Dubai Humanitarian members participate in strategic workshops and coordination meetings arranged by Dubai Humanitarian to intensify efforts and cultivate a disaster preparedness culture.



In the dynamic tapestry of YallaGive's 2023 journey, we proudly illuminated the path of compassion, unity, and impactful giving. Serving as the official fundraising partner of the renowned Dubai Marathon marked a significant milestone for us, as we collaborated seamlessly with the organizations registered in Dubai Humanitarian (IHC previously) to channel the energy of the running community into a force for good.

Together, we demonstrated that the spirit of philanthropy can thrive in the heartbeat of athletic endeavors. The funds raised during this prestigious event transcended mere numbers; they symbolized a collective commitment to making a positive difference in the lives of those in need. Our commitment to transformative giving reached new heights during the holy month of Ramadan with our "30 Days of Giving" campaign. Our fundraisers and donors rallied with unprecedented generosity, exemplifying the true spirit of Ramadan. In response to global crises, the UAE community once again showcased its benevolence.
